STEPHEN CENTER

Stephen Center partners with the community, families and individuals to overcome homelessness, addiction and poverty. Stephen Center, Inc. has served the homeless and low-income men, women and children in the Omaha Metro area since 1984. The organization was founded by Sharon and Dick McNeil who were determined to focus on the particular needs of the poor in south Omaha. Stephen Center has three distinct programs and Stephen Center Thrift at 5128 S 24th street.

- Stephen Center Emergency Shelter is the only dry shelter in the metro area. It is staffed 24 hours a day and all guests are treated with dignity and respect.
- The HERO Program is our state-licensed substance abuse treatment program. The evidence-based twelve step supported program also supports those with a co-occurring mental illness.
- The Transitional Living Program utilizes a strength-based case management philosophy to help participants attain self-sufficiency and build self-esteem.
- Stephen Center Thrift is open to the public. It also provides jobs and job training to clients in all three Stephen Center Programs and clients are given vouchers to shop for the items that they might need. Any proceeds go to support the Stephen Center mission.

LIGHTS: Install lights over all doors, mount spot lights on each corner of the house to illuminate all exterior walls.

RECORD ALL VALUABLE PROPERTY: Keep a record of serial numbers along with a detailed description of your property. Engrave your social security number on all articles for additional protection.

SLIDING DOORS AND WINDOWS: Cut a heavy dowel or broom handle to the length of the bottom track and lay it in the track so that the door or window will not slide open when forced. Your door and window dealer also sell devices that serve this purpose.

BASEMENT OR KITCHEN DOORS AND WINDOWS: Consider securing with strong ornamental grills or screens.

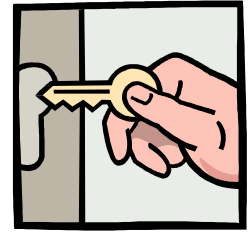
SASH WINDOWS: Should be secured with quality locking devices. Small wooden blocks or similar devices should be installed in the side tracks to limit the height that the windows can be opened to four (4) inches.

GARAGE DOORS: Should be closed and properly locked. All ladders and tools that may help a burglar break into your house should be locked in the garage or house.

PORCH AND YARD: Should be clear of all newspapers and circulars. Keep the grass mowed and the snow shoveled.

DOGS: Any dog that barks loudly when a stranger comes to the door is a good deterrent. The noise will scare away most burglars.

BURGLAR ALARMS: Shop for the system that best fits your needs. Alarms do discourage burglars.

HINTS & INFORMATION

5 THINGS YOU NEVER KNEW YOUR CELL PHONE COULD DO

For all the folks with cell phones. (This should be printed and kept in your car, purse, and wallet. Good information to have with you.) There are a few things that can be done in times of grave emergencies. Your mobile phone can actually be a life saver or an emergency tool for survival. Check out the things that you can do with it:

- FIRST (Emergency)

The Emergency Number worldwide for Mobile is 112. If you find yourself out of the coverage area of your mobile network and there is an Emergency, dial 112 and the mobile will search any existing network to establish the emergency number for you, and interestingly, this number 112 can be dialed even if the keypad is locked. Try it out.

- SECOND (Locked Keys in Car)

Have you locked your keys in the car? Does your car have remote keyless entry? This may come in handy someday. Good reason to own a cell phone: If you lock your keys in the car and the spare keys are at home, call someone at home on their cell phone from your cell phone. Hold your cell phone about a foot from your car door and have the person at your home press the unlock button, holding it near the mobile phone on their end. Your car will unlock. Saves someone from having to drive your keys to you. Distance is no object. You could be hundreds of miles away, and if you can reach someone who has the other 'remote' for your car, you can unlock the doors (or the trunk).

- THIRD (Hidden Battery Power)

Imagine your cell battery is very low. To activate, press the keys *3370#. Your cell phone will restart with this reserve and the instrument will show a 50% increase in battery. This reserve will get charged when you charge your cell phone next time.

- FOURTH (How to disable a STOLEN mobile phone?)

To check your Mobile phone's serial number, key in the following Digits on your phone: *#06#. A 15-digit code will appear on the screen. This number is unique to your handset. Write it down and keep it somewhere safe. If your phone is stolen, you can phone your service provider and give them this code. They will then be able to block your handset so even if the thief changes the SIM card, your phone will be totally useless. You probably won't get your phone back, but at least you know that whoever stole it can't use/sell it either. If everybody does this, there would be no point in people stealing mobile phones.

- FIFTH (Free Directory Service for Cells)

Cell phone companies are charging us \$1.00 to \$1.75 or more for 411 information calls when they don't have to. Most of us do not carry a telephone directory in our vehicle, which makes this situation even more of a problem. When you need to use the 411 information option, simply dial: (800) FREE411 or (800) 373-3411 without incurring any charge at all. Program this into your cell phone now.

Notes taken from the SOETF MEETING MINUTES FOR AUGUST 12th

Don Preister opened the meeting at 7:37 AM by welcoming and thanking everyone for attending and participating. He shared the mission for SOETF, seeking to identify area environmental problems, then implementing corrective solutions to them, in a spirit of voluntary cooperation with business, residents, and government. If anyone has not had the opportunity to tour the Kroc Center, a tour will be available after the meeting. Don then asked for self-introductions from all participants:

Spill Report: The street spills report will be sent out once it is received, as several people in the department that put it together are on vacation. Sue Bednarz has noticed more spills on the turn near 33rd St in the past few weeks. Jim Laughlin said they notice more spills on outgoing trucks versus incoming trucks, with the majority of the spills being near the on ramp to I-80. Mary Ann Krzemien expressed some frustration with the reporting process for reporting manure spills that involve the interstate. She asked if the city spill line could be given the instructions for whom to contact regarding interstate spills.

Truck Compliance: Trooper Myron Bell shared that two selectives were held near the I-80 intersection. From April through July there were 12 citations for spilling and 29 for load securment issued in Douglas County. In Sarpy County, there were 14 for spilling and 25 for load securement. They had one incident with XL 4 Star Beef about a month ago, which XL handled since it was on their property. Jim Matthews stated that security is out on the street now to stop trucks and make sure they are coming to the correct property and to observe any spills on the road. If there is a spill, they do fine the driver \$500. Rebecca Barrientos-Patlan asked if they have seen problems at the 33rd and L intersection. A few times, there has been truck traffic blocked up which then block the intersection. Trooper Bell said they have taken enforcement action on this type of situation before. Councilman Garry Gernandt said he has received complaints on 3 areas, 33rd and L, westbound I-80 to south JFK and North JFK to westbound I-80. The areas look like old spills that have been cleaned up, but these may be good areas to do enforcement since there is a problem there. Trooper Bell said most of the truckers do not see spills as a problem. It is hard to make them realize how slick the spills make the roadway. The fine is a waiveable fine, not one that requires them to appear in court. Mary Ann asked if there was a way to educate truckers coming into Omaha about the dangers associated with manure spills. The trucking association does have a good flyer about spills that goes out to all drivers that are part of the trucking association. Rebecca asked about a new ordinance requiring trucks to wash out. Ticketing for spilling is currently a state statute, but a new city ordinance on spilling could make the offense something that you must appear in court for. Jim Laughlin asked about the status of giving drivers tickets to wash out their trucks or having an on-site truck wash. Don said this is something they are still looking at and finding ways to make work. Phil Eason shared that truck drivers on short hauls only make about \$100 a haul, so they do not want to pay \$80 to wash out their truck. Don stated that we discussed new signage on L St. Councilman Gernandt followed up with the streets department, but was told the signs are costly and are not a high priority because the signs would only pertain to a minority of drivers. New signs could be put up if they were paid for by an outside source. He is still waiting to hear a final word on the cost of new signs from the streets department. Pete McClymont said the Nebraska Cattlemen are putting an article in their next publication about spills. He has also talked to the Iowa Cattlemen organization about putting an article in their next newsletter as well. Trooper Bell said spilling a load is a moving violation. It does take a point from their driver’s license. He has been writing more tickets under state statute for that reason to try to get the truckers attention about the importance of not spilling. Truck drivers say they wish businesses would help them, regarding the way unloading is scheduling and time they have to wait. Phil shared that trucking companies often tell truckers to come back to their property to wash out, and if the drivers want to wash out their trucks before hand, they must pay for it themselves. Don said it is good to hear the driver’s perspective since we do not have them represented here. Rebecca said she knows several drivers, would be willing to invite them to next meeting. Pete said he could also look for someone who is actively involved to come participate. Mary Ann suggested forming a committee to look into the possibilities of having some type of truck wash on site at the various businesses and other manure related issues. Don, Mary Ann, Duane, Jim Matthews, Councilman Gernandt, and Mike Arends said they would be interested. Jim Matthews said XL 4 Star was deterred from doing an on-site wash because of the amount that they would be charged for extra waste going down the sewer system, but he did not have monetary amount of what the cost would be. Keith Fulton said the space required for a wash is a deterrent for Darling. Most of their properties are on small lots so fitting in a wash would be difficult. Time would also be an issue due to number of trucks coming in each day. Dorothy Patach asked about the truck wash that John Pogge was looking into. There is a lot of new development in the area, including restaurants and a grocery store so it might not be the best place to put a truck wash. Jim Laughlin asked if trucks were inspected before they leave the packinghouses to make sure the truck’s clean out trap is closed. Trooper Bell said most of the drivers that have problems put the traps in crooked when they leave the feedlot so some waste will fall out as they drive to the plant. They do not stop to fix this before they come into the city, so it spills here as well. Trooper Bell asked how much it would cost to have a pump truck, like those used on portable restrooms, to use on each truck. No one was sure of the costs related to that. Mike Getty said the Kroc Center is much nicer than the old packing plant that was here! There was an article in the Omaha World Herald on Saturday about a graffiti art project. One of the students featured was previously arrested for graffiti but did not go to trial because the properties that had been painted did not appear. Graffiti numbers appear to be down. We still have two graffiti vans, so please report graffiti when you see it. He will check on code issues related to truck spills and get back to Don. Don asked if anyone had data related to volume in trucks before manure spills, sewage fees, and other

related issues. If you do, please send this information to Don for the subcommittee to use. Depending on work, the subcommittee may have another large group meeting in addition to October meeting this year.

Air Quality: Jim Matthews said XL 4 Star received four or five complaints via email from city. They have made airflow changes to make sure all air gets to the scrubber. They monitor data related to the air scrubber every hour. They are looking at using a different type of chemical in the scrubber. They added a 'sniff tube' for air coming off of the scrubber so anyone at the plant can walk by and smell the air that is coming out of scrubber. They have had no major upsets since the last meeting. Al Asherin said American Labs' sewer separation project is virtually complete. They have had no air issues. Mike Musgrave shared that at the Darling rendering plant tonnage is down, and no site-specific complaints have been received. They are shutting down between midnight and 1am each night. The hot weather does contribute to odors. Keith Fulton said the Darling blending had misters installed over the winter, and they have not received an odor complaint all summer. Please call the plant if there are odor problems. Councilman Gernandt said he is still receiving calls about the dog food smell mid-week from 8pm-2am, and he has passed them on to the city air quality department. Phil Eason said heat and humidity is treated like an emergency situation at his Darling plant because it is when they have the highest chance of having a problem. Tim Burns said the odor patrol is up and running. Omaha has received enough rain that the sewers seem to have been flushed out. Most problems they are seeing are related to metrological issues increasing smells that are normally there. Mike Arends said construction near 22nd and Washington will begin in 2012, not 2010. They have been handling twice the amount they normally do through system recently. The Missouri River Treatment plant has received two complaints this year, 1 since last meeting, which was related to too much chemical in a scrubber. All systems are now operating correctly. They are currently installing covers at facility. They completed the repairs to the north inlet scrubber that were mentioned at least meeting. They did have a failure at tail end of College World Series, they so changed plant operations to work around this problem without causing issues.

Sue Bednarz said she has seen a lot more graffiti near where Taylor's Greenhouse used to be on 36th Street. When tenets of commercial buildings move out, the graffiti in the area goes up. A new income tax preparation business is going into where Taylor's was, so that should make a difference. Duane Brooks thanked those who sponsored the SONA banquet in June. Dorothy Patach said SOBA and Deer Park do not have any complaints. She did see graffiti at 25th & O, which has not been hit for a long time. Mary Ann Krzemien said she appreciated everyone coming to meet four times a year to better community. Pete McClymont thanked Tim for getting him the letter the mayor sent out about manure spills so they can include it in their newsletter. Chuck Casanova with Perkins Properties said the theatre was hit with graffiti. An employee called to tell him, and 25 minutes later the graffiti van was there and had cleaned up the property. Sue Bednarz asked what is being done with the theatre and Blockbuster properties. Chuck said the Blockbuster property does not belong to Perkins, but he knows the owner. The plan is to turn the building into three small bays for businesses. Several people have asked about reopening the theatre as a theatre. He has also received calls from people with churches who are interested in it. Don thanked those who have pledged help or given checks to repair the Packers Monument. SONA has agreed to act as a conduit for these funds since they are a 501(c) 3. Once the repairs are complete, a rededication ceremony will be held, and we will let everyone know when this occurs.

Don thanked everyone for their attendance and the meeting adjourned

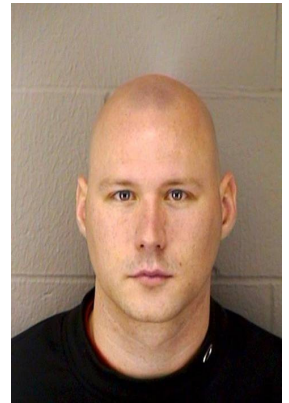
